
Marvin Jr. worked for the Massey Ferguson Dealership, St. Joseph Equipment in St. Joseph, Wisconsin for fifty-five years. When Marvin started at the dealership in 1961, he was washing and painting equipment, eventually moving to a

mechanics position during the day and doing sales at night. In time, he started doing sales full time, worked extensively with Massey Ferguson dealer representatives. He had seen a lot of changes from the MF 35-50 Series to the 8000 Series tractors before he retired. In retirement, Marvin enjoys using the family Massey collection on the farm.

When Dennis and I were old enough, we started working at the dealership after school cleaning the shop, washing and

painting. So, when we bought our own tractors, we wanted to keep them looking new so it was natural that we repainted them. I am still painting today for a hobby. I've painted my Massey Ferguson 135, 35 and 165 that we use on the hobby farm today. The next project to paint is the MF 180. One thing we learned from our dad was to always do good work, details are very important and of course, to work hard. Like any father and son there is some arguing




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

about which way is the best way to do it but we always manage to work it out. Our paint jobs include taking sheet metal, tires and fenders off to get a nice clean paint job. Working at the St. Joseph Dealership, it was the same way. I've gotten to paint MF 55 wheel loaders, 50ATLB, 600 dozers and 450S excavators.

Not only did we work hard we had to play a little too. When snowmobiling started out in 1967 and Massey came out with the Ski Whiz line, dad was working at a dealership and he got to bring one home and we all got rides on it. In the 1970's, the family got a new 500SST and we all could ride on it mom, dad, Dennis, and myself. When Susie was old enough, we added another sled. We had the 500SST, a 440 WT and many others throughout the years. Dennis still has his 440T today. Trail riding in Wisconsin was getting popular and the whole family enjoyed the sport.
